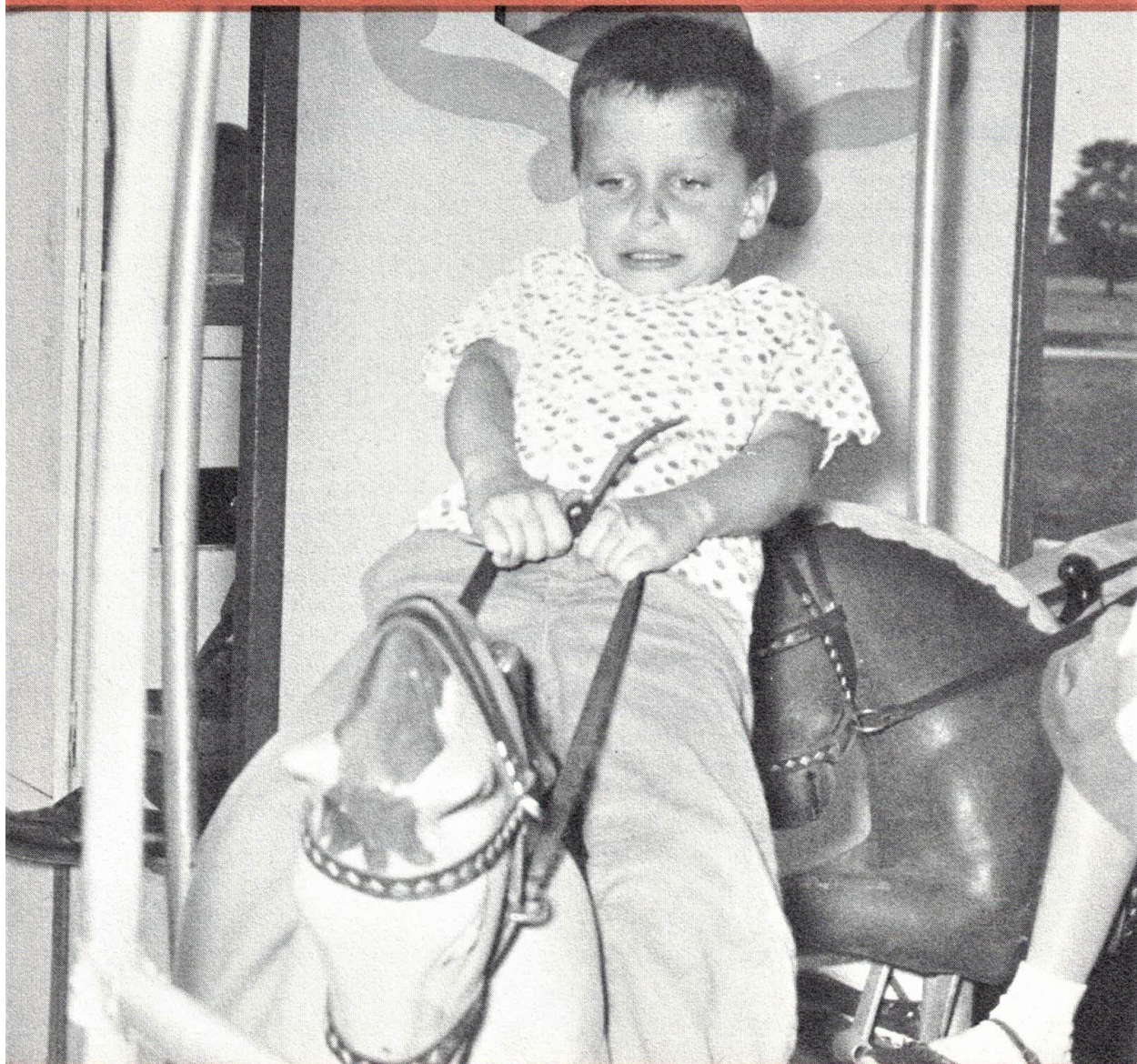

Practical Nurses Begin Training

The first class of practical nursing students began the clinical phase of their training at Parkview May 19. Under Mrs. Betty Funck, R.N., clinical instructor, the eight students will receive clinical experience in the medical, surgical, maternity, pediatrics, dietary services.

The eight are members of the first class of 23 enrolled in the new Practical Nurses' School of Fort Wayne Com-

munity Schools. The others are receiving their clinical experience at Lutheran and St. Joseph's Hospitals.

A 16½ weeks academic course preceded the 32-weeks hospital phase after which they will be eligible to take State Board examinations for licensed practical nurses.

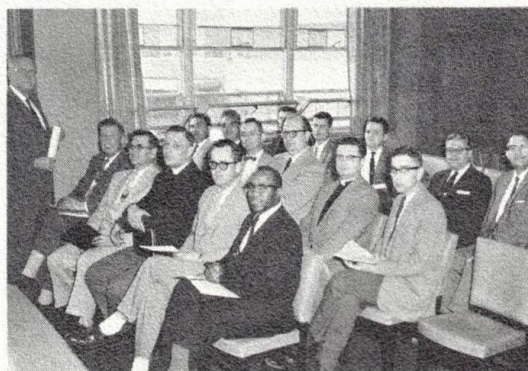

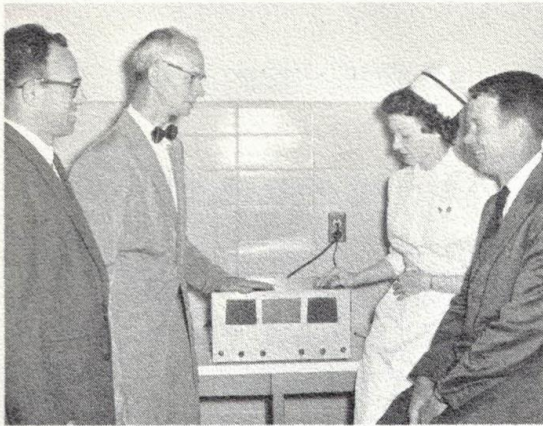

Generous gifts have been received from the Moirae Junior Study Club for the Pediatrics Department, and from Parkview's Nurses' Alumni for the School of Nursing.

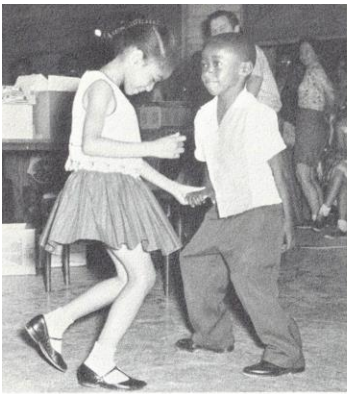

Having completed four years of academic study, the students will receive the bachelor of science degree in physical therapy upon completion of their clinical affiliation here.



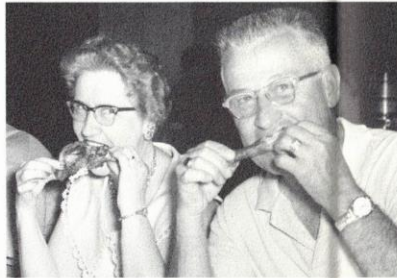
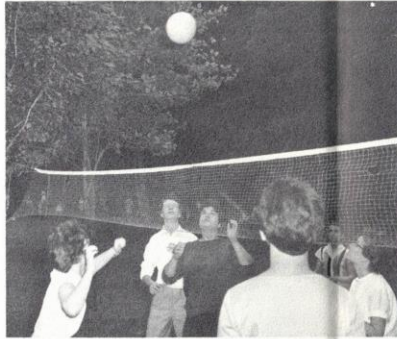

White Cross News

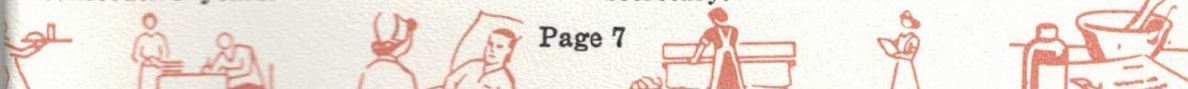
The White Cross Council held its 24th annual meeting on May 11 at the Wayne Street Methodist Church.

Service Awards Given

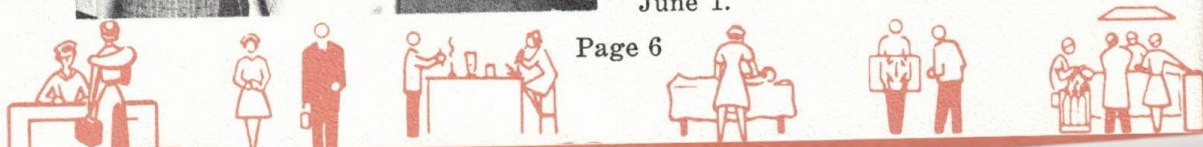
Parkview employees with long time service records were recognized at the seventh annual service banquet May 12 at New Haven Methodist Church.
